<u>RPIEAnalysis</u> Overthe past three years, the retention rate for the Film Studies Program was significantly higher than the retention rate at the institutional level. No courses within the Film Studies Program claimed a retention rate that differed significantly from the program-level rate. The retention rate for the Flim Studies Program falls within the third quartile (Q3) among program-level retention rates (across 8 instructional programs, over the past three years). The retention rate for Film Studies among the highest 50% of retention rates among NV Q programs.

Overthe past three years, the success futours ecompletion rate for the Film Studies Programwas significantly higher than the rate at the institutional level. No courses within the Flim Studies Program claimed a success futours ecompletion rate that was significantly lower than the program level rate. The success futours ecompletion rate for FILM110 was significantly higher than the program level rate. The success futours ecompletion rate for FILM110 was significantly higher than the program level rate. The success futours e completion rate for Film Studies falls within the second puartile (Q2) among program level success futours ecompletion rates (across 8 instructional programs, over the past three years). Overthe past three years, the difference between retention and success futourse completionat the program level (19.4%) was significantly higher than the difference at the institutional level (17.3%).
